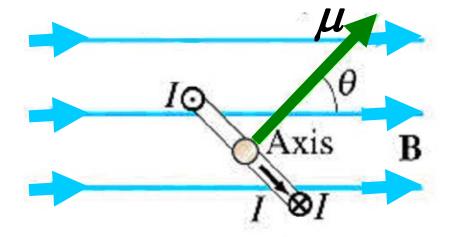
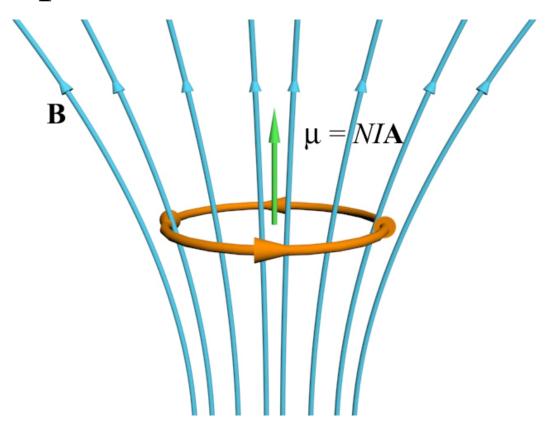
## Dipole in Field



## The coil above will:

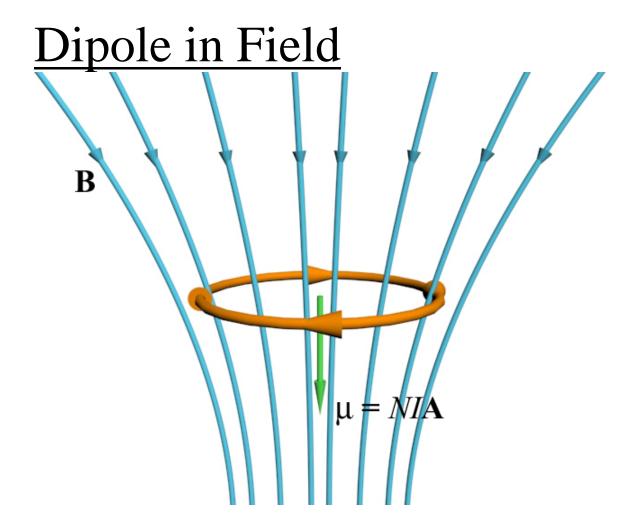
- 1. rotate clockwise, not move
- 2. rotate countercw, not move
- 3. move to the right, no rotation
- 4. move to the left, no rotation
- 5. move in another direction, without rotation
- 6. move and rotate
- 7. no net force so no rotation or motion

## Dipole in Field



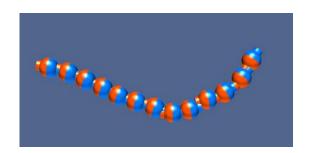
The current carrying coil above will move

- 1. upwards
- 2. downwards
- 3. stay where it is because the total force is zero



The current-carrying coil above will move

- 1. upwards
- 2. downwards
- 3. stay where it is because the total force is zero



Free dipoles attract because:

- 1. The force between dipoles is always attractive independent of orientation.
- 2. A dipole will always move towards stronger field, independent of orientation.
- 3. The torque on the dipole aligns it with the local field and the dipole will then move toward stronger field strength.
